Sixtystyle - Patterns 1/2 in Rows

The following crochet patterns are based on a stitch count divisible by 3 or 6, plus 1.
A stitch count divisible by 6 + 1 always fits.

You can change from crochet to knitting, or vice versa, in any row you like.

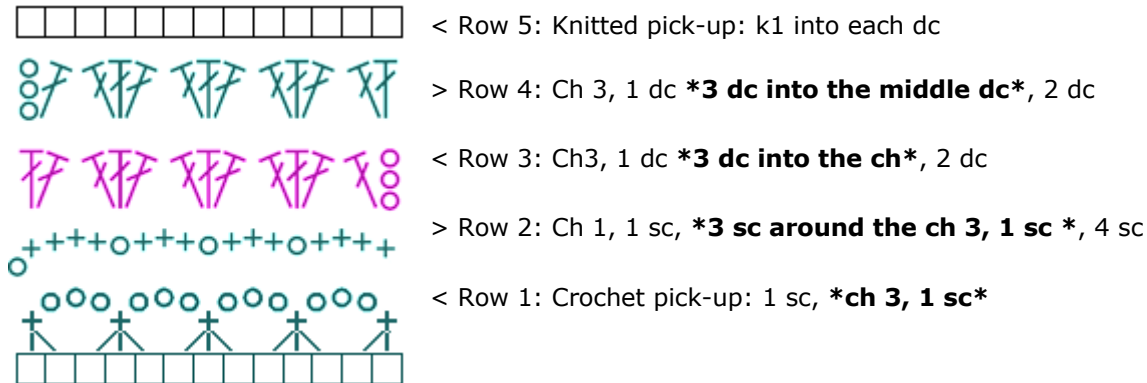
If you pick up knitted stitches in a wrong-side row, you should use the colour of the previous row.
Sometimes, there are two consecutive yarn overs in a pick-up row of knitted stitches. In the following row, knit 1, purl 1.

A note about the crochet pick-up:

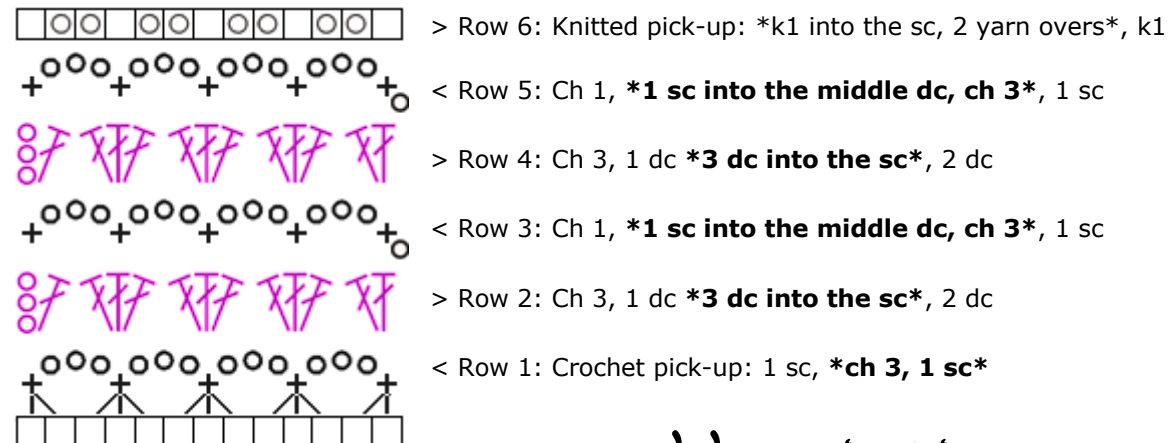
At the beginning and the end of the row, take two knitted stitches on your crochet hook and make a single crochet (UK: double crochet). During the row, take three knitted stitches on your crochet hook and make a single crochet (UK: double crochet).

The pattern uses US terminology. UK terms are stated in the abbreviations.

Abbreviations:

- k knit stitch
- ch chain stitch
- sc single crochet (UK: double crochet)
- dc double crochet (UK: treble crochet)
